As congregate care facilities across the country continue to struggle to obtain these types of products, the celebration of such a partnership felt incredibly tone deaf. To top it off, Dodgers third baseman Justin Turner, having been pulled in the middle of Game 6 due to a positive COVID test, celebrated on the field after that game, infecting who knows how many people, with it being explained away with comments such as "He just really wanted to be out there with the team, and who was going to stop him?" How about any responsible adult? Look, I should mention that I'm a lifelong Giants fan. I was born to ruin the Dodgers first moments of joy since Rick Astley was topping the charts in an unironic way. But that isn't even my point. The problem here is how much of this country has decided that they are tired of COVID practices, especially when it interferes with something they want. The Haunting of Bly Manor




Getting into the Halloween spirit, Gabe reviewed the Netflix miniseries *The Haunting of Bly Manor* after binging his way through it in two nights with his fiancé. Gabe continued, "You've got Ghost, but that's a romance. There's Casper, but that's a family adventure film. The only ghost movie to really pull it off is Poltergeist." 





In his seven-plus years with Crestwood, Gabe has consistently epitomized the Crestwood values, setting an example for our community about what it means to be part of this organization. After beginning his Crestwood career as a Dietary Aide at Crestwood American River, he began working overnight shifts at their PHF program, bringing a calm and engaging demeanor to people most in need. When life circumstances changed six years back, Gabe transferred to Pleasant Hill, and quickly became an incredibly skillful Service Coordinator on the Pathway. He later became a founding member of our facility's transition program, was a guiding voice in creating our community agreement and facility mission statement through our Strategic Planning Committee, and drove our efforts to shift energy toward community service and partnership. Darby's Vegetarian Recipe of the Month Egg Scramble

National meat shortages inspiring you to go veg? Give this vegetarian option a try!

Among the many things that I miss about the prepandemic world is going out for breakfast. Because of that and because meal prep boxes have changed my dinner time routine completely, check out this easy but hearty weekday or weekend breakfast!

Ingredients:

- 2 eggs
- Splash of milk (optional)
- 1-2 tbps butter
- 5-6 cherry tomatoes, cut in half
- 3-5 baby bella mushrooms, broken into bitesized pieces
- 2-3 pinches of goat cheese
- Handful of spinach
- Salt and pepper to taste

Egg Scramble

- 1. Heat butter in a skillet until melted.
- Sautee tomatoes and mushrooms until tomatoes are soft and mushrooms have browned (5-6 minutes), stirring occasionally
- 3. In the meantime, beat the eggs in a bowl. Add milk if desired.
- 4. Stir goat cheese into eggs.
- Pour egg mixture over the tomatoes and mushrooms
- 6. Top with handful of spinach
- 7. Mix egg scramble until desired texture is reached.
