Farewell to Angelica

As she embarks on the next step of her life, moving with her now husband Tyler to take an Administrator job in the greater Portland area, we will do our best to capture the tremendous impact that Angelica made in her 6 years with Crestwood Pleasant Hill. From the initial days of her time with us beginning October of 2014, Angelica sought out ways she could learn more, get involved in extra projects and behaviorally exemplify the Crestwood values. She was originally slated to start as a Recovery Coach, but it was a matter of moments before she was a Service Coordinator. In her first week, she requested to join (and catch up to) the DBT consultation team that had already begun its training. By Thanksgiving, she was someone the facility was already relying on, and she was part of the group hosting our annual event. In 2015, she became our facility's first Admission-Discharge Coordinator, and that year was voted as the facility's Crestwood Values Award winner for Family (as well as our facility's Green Award). In 2016, she added the role of Director of Staff Education, and after completely revamping the facility's employee orientation process, she became the Pathway Program Director in 2018. Her progression through these roles came from her outstanding character and work ethic, and she threw herself into everything the facility was doing to try to improve our community and the lives of the people we serve. She helped create our Health and Fitness Project, was a founding member of our Strategic Planning Committee and participated in countless community service and awareness activities. She created new groups and systems, numerous new trainings for employees, and made an immeasurable difference for so many of our people. She



was a Crestwood Wildcat softball champion, and a trash-talking veteran of every internal sports league we've put on. The resume is jam-packed, and this obituary covers a piece of it, but what most of us are left with is not all the titles and specific things she was involved in, but instead what it meant to actually work alongside Angelica. Every day of her time with Crestwood, she carried herself with grace, integrity and deep compassion for the people we serve. To work with Angelica was to know that you had someone you could rely on and trust, someone who would look out for you as an individual, and someone who would work whatever hours it took to get the job done. Angelica's creativity and thoughtfulness led to a range of lasting growth around the building, and the absence of her humor and enthusiasm will leave a gap in our community. She is survived by leaves a facility that is so much better because of the time she spent in it, and so grateful for the time we all shared together. Thank you, Angelica, for your incredible service to this community you will always be part of.


The Loveland Foundation

Darby's Vegetarian Recipe of the Month Classic Caprese

National meat shortages inspiring you to go veg? Give this vegetarian option a try!

Tomatoes are nearing the end of their season, so they are in my InstaCart order every week. Though a recent Blue Apron subscription has me eating dinner 30 minutes after I get home, I can't resist munching on this classic and simple appetizer while cooking! Heirloom tomatoes have the best flavor and texture in my opinion and are thus worthy of center stage (as opposed to beefsteak or roma).

Ingredients:

1 Heirloom tomato (per person) 1 ball of fresh mozzarella 3-4 basil leaves Optional: avocado (if you're feeling decadent and don't have dinner lined up for after) Olive oil Balsamic vinegar



Seasoning of choice (use your own savory spice blend or go simple with salt and pepper)

- 1. Cut tomato and mozzarella (and avocado if using) into bite sized pieces and put in bowl.
- 2. Tear basil with your hands and put in bowl (cutting basil will bruise it).
- 3. Drizzle as much olive oil and balsamic as you see fit.
- 4. Season to taste.

Angelica's Recipe of the Month Caprese Grilled Steak or Chicken

I'm sticking with Darby's fall caprese theme, but this version adds a meat option of your choice!

- -4 six ounce steaks or chicken breasts
 -8 slices of tomato
 -4 slices of fresh mozzarella
 -Olive oil
 -Balsamic vinegar
- -8 fresh basil leaves



Season your steak or chicken with salt and pepper and then lightly brush the meat with olive oil. Heat grill to high until hot. Reduce to medium and place meat on the grill. Cook meat to your desired cooking, flipping sides at least once. Once meat is cooked, stack with tomatoes, mozzarella and basil on top. Drizzle balsamic vinegar and serve. Enjoy!
